As a teacher, I have made a program especially for those who have problems in reading and writing which is done after lesson twice a week, for both learners who don't know how to read and write so that we move together. Parents also are called in order to help them and emphasize to make the students improve on absenteeism.

I am a recipient of a teacher training scholarship from HealthEd Connect. This scholarship helped me a lot. It has led me to pursue a diploma in primary education. I am very grateful for their support because it has helped me financially to pursue my diploma in teaching and some school requirement at my course.
